From the Pastor



Grace, Mercy and Peace be to you from our Lord and savior Jesus Christ. Amen.

I have recently been reading about the Reformation of the 1500s. More specifically the last words of Luther before his death in 1547. Also, the words of Elector John Fredrick the Magnanimous, ruler of Saxony, as he was in jail and threatened with death by the Emperor Charles V after losing a war and refusing to compromise his beliefs. These two men's words also reminded me of C.S, Lewis and his reaction to the threat of the atomic bomb. All three of these men were responding to a crisis of epic proportion.

For all of his bravado you have to imagine that Martin Luther could have had doubts that he was doing the right thing. After all, because of his writings (even though they were focused solely on the truth of the Word of God) the church and all of Europe with it was in chaos. He had effectively changed the whole landscape of the world. All he ever wanted was to study the Word of God and find comfort and peace there. He was 62 years old and seems to have died of a heart attack. So, let us look at the last words of Martin Luther.

His last words were a prayer. He said, "...I pray Thee, dear Lord Jesus Christ, let me commend my little soul to Thee. O heavenly Father, if I leave this body and depart, I am certain that I will be with Thee forever and can never, never tear myself out of Thy hands. God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish but have everlasting life." He was then asked by another pastor "Reverend Father, are you willing to die in the name of the Christ and the doctrine which you have preached?" Luther said "Yes" and died shortly thereafter.

Martin Luther wrote a lot. We have over 50 volumes of his works published into English. He translated the Hebrew Old Testament and the Greek New Testament into German. He was a professor, respected by very intelligent men, including Erasmus. With all of this prestige and intelligence and learning he relies on the simple words that any child raised in the church knows. It is the one verse out of the Bible that even many non-Christians recognize, "For God so loved the world, that He gave His only begotten Son". It is as simple as it is profound. God has done the work of salvation, our only hope rests in the fact that he loves us and will never let us go. As Luther said "I can never tear myself out of Thy hands." He understood how great is God's love for us. This is what enabled him to go against the pope, the whole Roman Catholic Church and the Emperor himself. He knew God loved him and he would not give up that confidence for anything. He died confident in his confession.

John Fredrick was not a pastor, but a politician. However, he had been taught from his youth the scriptures and as he says "by diligently searching the prophetic and apostolic Scriptures, I have also learned to know, and unswervingly to adhere in my conscience to this, that the articles composing the Augsburg Confession, and whatever is connected therewith, are the correct, true, Christian, pure doctrine, confirmed by and founded in, the writing of the holy prophets and apostles..." He then affirmed that he could not in good conscience reject these teachings without violating his faith and endangering his soul. He believed that if he denied his Lutheran (Biblical) faith, he would be denying God and he would rather rot in prison or die, than turn from it. Here is a layman who was taught the truth and sacrificed his land, his fortune, his freedom and his very life rather than deny is Lutheran faith.

Both of these men believed that it was more important to fear God than man. They both were willing to sacrifice everything rather than change what they believed. They were willing to die in their faith, than fall away and live a long and peaceful life. I have often prayed that I too would be willing in that day to die rather than deny what I believe.

That brings us to C.S. Lewis who when writing about the threat of atomic war looming over the world in his day he wrote this: "Believe me, dear sir or madam, you and all whom you love were already sentenced to death before the atomic bomb was invented: and quite a high percentage of us were going to die in unpleasant ways." "...if we are all going to be destroyed by an atomic bomb, let that bomb when it comes find us doing sensible and human things – praying, working, teaching, reading, listening to music, bathing the children, playing tennis, chatting to our friends over a pint and a game of darts – not huddled together like frightened sheep and thinking about bombs. They may break our bodies (a microbe can do that) but they need not dominate our minds." He was not facing imprisonment of death immediately, but he is still in the same mindset of Luther and John Fredrick, let us not live in fear of dying, but rather rejoice in living. Especially living and doing that which God has called us to do. As we read a couple of weeks ago, "For we are His workmanship, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand, that we should walk in them." Eph 2:10 With new variants of the virus, chaos on the world and national stage we are in a time of great fear and anxiety for many. But as Christians who know that God loves us, we do not need to live in fear, but rather continue to love one another and pray for everyone, that we might do the works that God has prepared for us. Remember, this situation is not a surprise to God, that means that the works he has prepared for us to do were meant to be done at this time in this situation. We should live with the expectation that we are under a death sentence, after all everyone dies, but that is not an excuse to be filled with fear and worry and doubt, but rather an opportunity to turn to the Lord for strength and peace. The peace that only he can give and which surpasses all understanding. To live is Christ and to die is gain. In the in-between is an opportunity to be filled with joy, because God so love you that he gave His only begotten Son to die, for YOU. Peace be with you. Amen.

BOARD REPORTS

<u>COMMUNICATION:</u> A report was distributed with the metrics for the month of July. Of the 188 Friday newsletters mailed out, approximately 96-109 read it on a regular basis. Paper copies and sermon transcripts are mailed to 18 shut-ins. There was also some discussion about the height of the electric sign; that it was difficult to read. Kelly will assume responsibility for programing the sign.

ELDERS: No report. Kelly did have a copy of the minutes of their last meeting which mentions some planned activities such as new member welcome and bring a friend Sunday. There was no mention of who was in charge of these activities, if they should be advertised in the newspapers, or any planned program. The council voiced concern that when any group plans an activity, they must assume responsibility for the planning and implementation. If there is to be food, who will provide it, serve it, and clean up afterwards. There should always be someone in charge of the event that questions can be directed to.

LWML: The officers met and planned the agenda for the year. The Sept. 9 meeting will feature a Prayer Service, *Living in Love, Bearing Fruit,* written by District President Greg Walton. All members of the congregation are invited to this 10 a.m. service. A salad luncheon will follow.

TRUSTEES: The kitchen stove hood needs to be hooked up to the fire alarm system to be in compliance with government rules.

The next Council meeting will be **September 7, 2021**, at 6:00 pm The meeting adjourned at 7:30 p.m. followed by prayer.
